e often think of firsttimers as a young couple with kids or with plans for them, resulting in designs with a family focus and the flexibility to expand as needed.

- A front porch is critical to establish relationships with neighbors and the community
- B Flex space can serve several functions: an adult escape, formal dining, home office, kids' playroom, or a guest bedroom
- A windowed alcove with optional table and benches is ideal for visiting with the cook or supervising homework
- Kitchen and great room are the home's hub, with expansive views to the rear yard and motor court
- An optional outdoor room adds a shaded or protected space to enjoy the yard
- This garage placement brings the garage door off the street; flip the door to the back for an alley or corner lots



• The motor court doubles as a play or entertaining area adjacent to the kitchen and side porch. On an alley lot, this becomes a patio, grassy yard, and/or kitchen garden



On the second floor, the central gathering room lives large for the family to play, study, or lounge. Laundry space is open, with the option to wall it off

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
